A Message from Rick Beltrame, Director of Fire Department

The Melrose Park Fire Department and Director of Fire Department Rick Beltrame want to ensure the safety of our residents and their families by providing these portable space heater safety tips on behalf of the National Fire Protection Association.

Please follow these tips to ensure your family's well-being!



When the weather turns cold, it can bring a chill into our homes. Portable space heaters have become a popular way to supplement central heating or heat one room. If you plan to use portable electric space heaters, make sure to follow these tips and recommendations:

HEATER CHECKLIST

- Purchase a heater with the seal of a qualified testing laboratory.
- Keep the heater at least 3 feet (1 metre) away from anything that can burn, including people.
- Choose a heater with a thermostat and overheat protection.
- Place the heater on a solid, flat surface.
- Make sure your heater has an auto shut-off to turn the heater off if it tips over.
- Keep space heaters out of the way of foot traffic.
 Never block an exit.
- Keep children away from the space heater.
- Plug the heater directly into the wall outlet.
 Never use an extension cord.
- Space heaters should be turned off and unplugged when you leave the room or go to bed.

Types of electric space heaters

Oil or water-filled radiator Heated oil or water travels through the heater.

Fan-forced heater

A fan blows warm air over metal coils.

Ceramic heater

Air is warmed over a ceramic heating element.

Infrared heaters

Heat is created by infrared bulbs.

Fact

Two in five deaths in space heater fires involve portable electric space heaters.

As of Sunday, Dec. 1, 2024, parking is no longer permitted on both sides of the street on weekends.

Winter Holiday Safety Tips

This holiday season, don't let the spirit of giving lull you into giving burglars, muggers and pickpockets a better chance to do their dirty work. Crooks love the holidays as much as everyone else, especially because it's an opportune time for crime. Homes jam packed with glittering gifts. Stores, malls and downtown streets teeming with unsuspecting shoppers. People rushing around, stressed out and careless, looking for last-minute gifts, trying to get everything done. It's enough to make a crook giddy with holiday joy.

Here are some tips on how to celebrate safely this holiday season.

If You are Traveling

- · Get an automatic timer for your lights.
- Ask a neighbor to watch your home, shovel snow and park in the driveway from time to time.
- Don't forget to have mail and newspaper delivery stopped. If it piles up, it's a sure sign you're gone.

If You are Out for the Evening

- Turn on lights and a radio or TV so it looks like someone's home.
- Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave, even if it's just for a few minutes.
- Don't display gifts where they can be seen from outside.

If You are Shopping

- Stay alert and be aware of what's going on around you.
- Park in a well-lighted space and be sure to lock the car, close the windows, and hide shopping bags and gifts in the trunk.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash, pay with a check or credit card whenever possible.
- Deter pickpockets and purse-snatchers. Don't overburden yourself with packages. Be extra careful with purses and wallets. Carry a purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps. Put a wallet in an inside coat or front pants pocket.
- Shopping with kids? Teach them to go to a store clerk or security guard if you get separated.

Protect Your Vehicle

- Loading up on all those gifts is a sign of progress in the holiday shopping. But if those packages are left out in the open after they're in the car, your car has become a likely target for thieves. Remember the old cliché "Out of sight, out of mind?" The same idea applies to items in your car.
- Always lock your vehicle and store all items out of sight. Breaking into an empty car isn't worth a thief's time. However, anything left in plain view from your holiday gifts to spare change, sunglasses, CDs, cell phones or briefcases may tempt a thief.
- Help prevent your vehicle from being stolen by always locking your car and using anti-theft devices. And, although it's cold, never leave your vehicle running while you run inside your home or a store even if it's for only a minute or two.

If a Stranger Comes to Your Door

- Criminals sometimes pose as couriers delivering gifts, so be cautious when accepting a package.
- It's not uncommon for people to try to take advantage of others' generosity during the holidays by going door-to-door for charitable donations when there's no charity involved. Ask for identification and find out how the funds will be used. If you aren't satisfied, don't give. Help a charitable organization you know and like instead.



After You've Opened the Gifts

• Burglars know that many households have new, and oftentimes expensive, items in their homes following the December holidays – especially items such as new computers and peripherals, stereo components, televisions, cameras and other electronic equipment. In too many cases, residents make it easy for burglars to figure out which homes to target by putting boxes that identify their new gifts in plain view with their other garbage. Avoid becoming an easy target for post-holiday burglars by not leaving boxes for new electronics and other items in the alley or other garbage pickup locations for several days at a time. Instead, break down any boxes you are throwing out, put them in garbage bags and place them inside a trash can. (In many cases, especially with computer equipment, you might consider keeping the boxes for safe storage, shipping or moving in the future.) Think about keeping broken-down boxes inside – in a garage, for example – until the evening before your regular garbage pickup. Some burglars actually look inside garbage cans for evidence of holiday gifts. And, of course, if you see someone suspicious casing your alley or if you see a burglary in progress, call the Melrose Park Police Department on 911.

Take a Holiday Inventory

- The holidays are a good time to update or create your home inventory. Take photos or make videos of items, and list descriptions and serial numbers. If your home is burglarized, having a detailed inventory can help identify stolen items and make insurance claims easier to file.
- Make sure things like TVs, VCRs, stereo equipment, cameras, camcorders, sports equipment, jewelry, silver, computers, home office equipment and power tools are on the list. Remember to check it twice!

Celebrate Responsibly

• The holiday season is a time of celebration and revelry. Drinking and driving is a danger to everyone on the road. Anyone with a BAC of .08 or higher is in violation of Illinois law and may go to jail. Remember that the risk isn't worth it – if you choose to drink alcohol at a party, don't drive. Take a cab, use public transportation or a designated driver. Have fun, but remember to celebrate responsibly.

Holiday Package Theft

- Track deliveries online and confirm delivery has occurred. You can sign up for email notifications to track your
 packages from initial shipment to its arrival at your home or the recipient's address if you have the gift delivered
 directly.
- If you know a family member or neighbor will be home, ask them to pick up the packages as soon as they are delivered. Reward them with fresh baked cookies.
- Switch delivery location to work where it can be received by someone and not left on the porch.
- See if the post office or store the product is being shipped from can hold the package for pickup.
- The post office will allow your package to remain safe and secure for up to 30 days.

Enjoy the Season!

• Last but not least, don't let holiday stress get the best of your holiday spirit. Make time to get together with family, friends and neighbors. And think about reaching out in the spirit of the season and helping someone who's less fortunate or lonely.

Silver Creek Restoration Project

Under the direction of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the Village of Melrose Park Public Works employees constructed the Silver Creek Eagles Nest Park. This is a natural preserve that includes a walking path and a pavilion/gazebo, along with a canoe/kayak launch.

Phase 5 and 6 of the Silver Creek Stabilization Project have been completed.

Phase 7 is underway.

This stabilization project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native landscape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.



Silver Creek Trail Park

The Silver Creek Trail Park is located off of First Avenue. The trail is centered off the pond between Silver Creek and its tributary, the Des Plaines River. Native plants of this area were once lost to development and are

now being reintroduced to the area. With the help of these native plants, more wildlife is returning to the area – from the Bald Eagle (sighted in the area), the Northern Pike, Red Foxes, Black-Crowned Night Herons and



Cooper's Hawk, to name a few.

- 2. Pets must be leashed.
- 3. Smoking or fires are prohibited.
- 4. Please clean up pet waste and dispose of it.

- 7. No hunting.
- 8. Fishermen must clean up any cut line, bail containers and all litter.
- 9. Park opens one hour after sunrise and closes one hour before sunset.
- 10. Enjoy the park.

- Host small gatherings or "watch parties" with neighbors to make the night even more special.





Winter Storms ... The Deceptive Killers

Winter storms can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Some winter storms are large enough to affect several states, while others affect only a single community. Many winter storms are accompanied by dangerously low temperatures and sometimes by strong winds, icing, sleet and freezing rain.

Regardless of the severity of a winter storm, you should be prepared in order to remain safe during these events.

Know the Difference

Winter Storm Outlook – Winter storm conditions are possible in the next two to five days.

Winter Weather Advisory – Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life threatening.

Winter Storm Watch – Winter storm conditions are possible within the next 36 to 48 hours. People in a watch area should review their winter storm plans and stay informed about weather conditions.

Winter Storm Warning – Life-threatening, severe winter conditions have begun or will begin within 24 hours. People in a warning area should take precautions immediately.

How to Prepare for a Winter Storm

- Winterize your vehicle and keep the gas tank full. A full tank will keep the fuel line from freezing.
- Insulate your home by installing storm windows or covering windows with plastic from the inside to keep cold air out.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected every year.
- If you will be going away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home, set to a temperature no lower than 55° F.

Put Together a Supply Kit

- Water at least a three-day supply; one gallon per person per day.
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable, easy-to-prepare food.
- · Flashlight.
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible).
- Extra batteries.
- First aid kit.
- Medications (seven-day supply) and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc.).
- Multipurpose tool.
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items.
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies).
- Cell phone with chargers.
- Family and emergency contact information.
- Extra cash.
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers).
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl).
- Tools/supplies for securing your home.
- · Sand, rock salt or non-clumping kitty litter to make walkways and steps less slippery.
- Warm coats, gloves or mittens, hats, boots, and extra blankets and warm clothing for all household members.
- Ample alternate heating methods such as fireplaces or wood- or coal-burning stoves.

Winter's Impact

Storms with Strong Winds

Sometimes winter storms are accompanied by strong winds creating blizzard conditions with blinding wind-driven snow, severe drifting and dangerous wind chill. Strong winds with these intense storms and cold fronts can knock down trees, utility poles and power lines. Storms near the coast can cause coastal flooding and beach erosion as well as sink ships at sea. In the west and Alaska, winds descending off the mountains can gust to 100 mph or more damaging roofs and other structures.

Extreme Cold

Extreme cold often accompanies a winter storm or is left in its wake. Prolonged exposure to the cold can cause frostbite or hypothermia and become life-threatening. Infants and elderly people are most susceptible. What constitutes extreme cold and its effect varies across different areas of the United States. In areas unaccustomed to winter weather, near freezing temperatures are considered "extreme cold." Freezing temperatures can cause severe damage to citrus fruit crops and other vegetation. Pipes may freeze and burst in homes that are poorly insulated or without heat. In the north, below zero temperatures may be considered as "extreme cold." Long cold spells can cause rivers to freeze, disrupting shipping. Ice jams may form and lead to flooding.

Ice Storms

Heavy accumulations of ice can bring down trees, electrical wires, telephone poles and lines, and communication towers. Communications and power can be disrupted for days while utility companies work to repair the extensive damage. Even small accumulations of ice may cause extreme hazards to motorists and pedestrians.

Heavy Snow Storms

Heavy snow can immobilize a region and paralyze a city, stranding commuters, stopping the flow of supplies and disrupting emergency and medical services. Accumulations of snow can collapse buildings and knock down trees and power lines. In rural areas, homes and farms may be isolated for days, and unprotected livestock may be lost. In the mountains, heavy snow can lead to avalanches. The cost of snow removal, repairing damages and loss of business can have large economic impacts on cities and towns.

Winter Precipitation

Snow

- FLURRIES Light snow falling for short durations. No accumulation or light dusting is all that is expected.
- SHOWERS Snow falling at varying intensities for brief periods of time. Some accumulation is possible.
- SQUALLS Brief, intense snow showers accompanied by strong, gusty winds. Accumulation may be significant. Snow squalls are best known in the Great Lakes region.
- BLOWING SNOW Wind-driven snow that reduces visibility and causes significant drifting. Blowing snow may be snow that is falling and/or loose snow on the ground picked up by the wind.
- BLIZZARD Winds over 35 mph with snow and blowing snow reducing visibility to near zero.

Sleet

Raindrops that freeze into ice pellets before reaching the ground. Sleet usually bounces when hitting a surface and does not stick to objects. However, it can accumulate like snow and cause a hazard to motorists.

Freezing Rain

Rain that falls onto a surface with a temperature below freezing. This causes it to freeze to surfaces, such as trees, cars, and roads, forming a coating or glaze of ice. Even small accumulations of ice can cause a significant hazard.

Winter Storm Facts: What Makes a Winter Storm?

Cold Air

Below freezing temperatures in the clouds and near the ground are necessary to make snow and/or ice.

Moisture

To form clouds and precipitation. Air blowing across a body of water, such as a large lake or the ocean, is an excellent source of moisture.

Lift

something to raise the moist air to form the clouds and cause precipitation. An example of lift is warm air colliding with cold air and being forced to rise over the cold dome. The boundary between the warm and cold air masses is called a front. Another example of lift is air flowing up a mountain side.


Thank you to all the community members who took some time out of their day on Thanksgiving to assist with Melrose Park's Meal Delivery Program.

Republic Services is contracted to pick up your regular, everyday garbage and household items, such as couches, tables, mattresses, box springs, desks and chairs, etc.

Recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays from April through November and must be placed in a 33-gallon refuse can or biodegradable paper bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted.

All items are to be put out the night before or morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Winston Park Area and West Melrose – Once garbage has been picked up, garbage container is to be removed from curb line and placed back on resident's property.

Alumni Spotlight: Maurice Wilson

Maurice Wilson, Walther Class of 2012, is an astrophysicist at the High Altitude Observatory, a National-Science-Foundation-(NSF)-funded research center in Boulder, Colorado.

Following high school, Maurice attended Embry Riddle Aeronautical University in Daytona Beach, Florida, where he received a B.S. in space physics. During his sophomore year, he joined a professor's astronomy lab where he wrote code to analyze data. "My experience in Web Design class at Walther learning html really helped," explained Maurice. That led to an internship opportunity through an NSF REU (research experience for undergrads) after his sophomore year. He was accepted at Harvard that summer and researched solar physics and stellar astrophysics.

In January of his junior year, Maurice presented on that summer research at an American Astronomical Society (AAS) conference. A Harvard professor was impressed enough with his work and presentation to invite Maurice for a second summer internship. That next summer he researched ways to detect small Earth-like exoplanets.

After graduating from Embry Riddle, Maurice received an NSF graduate research fellowship and spent two years earning an M.A. from Harvard followed by four years in the PhD program there. In 2022, he received his PhD in astrophysics from Harvard and won a postdoctoral fellowship from the NSF. For the last two years, this fellowship was conducted at the High Altitude Observatory where Maurice studied solar flares and coronal mass ejections. "It is good to now finally be a full employee at HAO," commented Maurice.

Maurice gives a lot of credit to Walther in setting him up for this success. "My chemistry class with Mr. Tuomi and two physics classes with Mr. Murphy, really got me excited about science. My AP Calc class prepared me for the mathematical challenges in my undergrad program and the perseverance I learned in AP US History helped me get through some tough undergrad classes."

"Wrestling really changed my life. Through the hardships I grew in perseverance and gained fearlessness. It can be really intimidating to talk to Harvard professors, but through wrestling I learned how to remain calm and collected in any situation."

Maurice has already been involved in some worldwide collaborations regarding astrophysics research. He plans to continue doing research, maybe some day at a research university. We look forward to following what Maurice accomplishes throughout his career.

Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ...

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.

The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our English-speaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.

The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are – endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

English Classes

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.

These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).

Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.

We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.

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Connecting Proviso Residents to Free Behavioral Health Resources

Representatives from Proviso Township's 14 municipalities, and local police and fire departments gathered recently to learn more about behavioral health resources that are available to their residents and how to help residents take advantage of those resources during a seminar hosted by the Proviso Township Mental Health Commission (PTMHC.)

"For nearly 60 years, the Proviso Township Mental Health Commission has provided funding for behavioral health services available to every resident in our township," said PTMHC President Mike Corrigan. "Ensuring that all the local governments and their residents under our umbrella have equal access

to these resources is vital to the health and well-being of our communities. Many residents will reach out to their local government for help and it's critical that those local governments can easily connect them to the services that they need. Best of all, these services are completely free for our residents."

The Proviso Township Mental Health Commission provides grants to 22 behavioral health agencies that deliver services to Proviso residents. Services cover senior care, mental health, homelessness and food insecurity, domestic violence, developmental disabilities, substance abuse and more.

Attendees at the seminar got a refresher on the wide range of services available to their residents, as well as tips on engaging communities about mental health topics and disseminating information about those services to their residents. A variety of media was curated and provided to attendees to utilize in the dissemination of information through their communication channels including, print newsletters, social media, websites, papers, digital flyers and more. These resources will make it easy for community leaders to communicate and connect residents to the mental health and other needed services right here in the township.

"When our neighbors don't get the help that they need, they often end up in crisis," said

Corrigan. "They may end up in the emergency room or they may lose their home. That has negative external impacts that affect all of us. It's better for everyone if people can stay healthy, housed and productive in their communities."

The 58-year-old Proviso Township Mental Health Commission is one of the oldest 708 boards in Illinois and serves behavioral health needs of the 155,000 residents of Proviso Township. The township covers 14 municipalities, including Bellwood, Berkeley, Broadview, Brookfield, Forest Park, Hillside, La Grange Park, Melrose Park, Maywood, North Riverside, Northlake, Stone Park, Westchester and Western Springs.

First Responders are Key to Stopping and Preventing Child Abuse Training Held in Proviso Township

Over 30 first responders from the western Cook County suburbs gathered at the Proviso Township Municipal Building to learn how to best investigate. stop and prevent child abuse. The training was held by the Proviso Children's Advocacy Center (PCAC) which has been a recipient of Proviso Township Mental Health Commission grant dollars for 32 years.

"We are so grateful to have the PCAC in our community making sure that our most vulnerable children do not fall through the cracks, but instead can receive the counseling, treatment and healing that they deserve and need after experiencing traumatic abuse," said Proviso Township Mental Health Commission President Mike Corrigan.

Attendees came from police and fire departments throughout the Cook County Fourth Municipal District and received training on a variety of topics, including the child physical abuse specialized medical exam, digital safety for kids, vicarious trauma and self-care for the helping professional and more. The training was presented by the Illinois Department of Child and Family Services (DCFS) and the Cook County State's Attorney's Office.

"Our first responders are critical for helping to identify and stop child abuse," said Corrigan. "We're proud to host this workshop to make sure that everyone involved knows the latest protocol and what kind of supports are available to the community and to officers."

in attendance received a complimentary breakfast sandwich, hash browns and coffee, and spoke with fellow veterans, veteran organizations, and local officials.



Giannoulias Launches DMV Kiosk Pilot Program

'Fast-Lane' DMVs at Illinois Retailers Offer Renewals Within Minutes

DMV kiosks located inside retail stores across the state will provide Illinoisans with a new option when it comes to renewing their driver's license or obtaining vehicle stickers, Secretary Alexi Giannoulias announced recently.

The Secretary of State's Office began rolling out "Fast-Lane" DMV kiosks as part of a pilot program this fall, deploying 15 kiosks located in Chicago, the suburbs and downstate in Mariano's, Jewel-Osco, Kroger and Meijer grocery stores.

"Fast-Lane kiosks offer added convenience for Illinois drivers who now have the ability to renew their driver's license or purchase a vehicle sticker while they're running errands or buying their groceries," said Giannoulias, who announced the program at the Mariano's in the West Loop. "This is a big step in our ongoing effort to modernize the office and enable Illinoisans to obtain more services online and remotely without having to visit a DMV."

"At Mariano's we are always looking for innovative ways to serve our customers and these kiosks offer incredible convenience. We are excited to launch this initiative with the Secretary of State's Office at our stores, which will create excitement for our shoppers," said Michael Marx, division president, Roundy's and Mariano's.

With an average transaction time of about two minutes, Illinoisans can renew their driver's licenses, state IDs and purchase vehicle stickers using the kiosks. Once the pilot is expanded, the Secretary of State's Office will look to add more services.

The kiosks serve as an alternative resource for those without online access or those with restrictive schedules, which make a trip to the DMV more difficult. Renewals conducted at a kiosk are more convenient and less expensive than at most currency exchanges or emission testing sites.

During the pilot phase, the kiosks will also offer services in English and Spanish, but Giannoulias plans to increase the number of languages available as the program expands.

Most Illinois drivers must renew their driver's license every four years and motorists must renew their vehicle registrations and obtain license plate stickers annually. Illinois drivers and motorists receive a renewal notice in the mail that includes a unique bar code for their account and an access PIN, which they will enter when using a kiosk.

The kiosks will print vehicle registration stickers for customers immediately on site. Customers seeking a driver's license or state ID card renewal will receive a temporary document at the kiosk to use while their new card is mailed to them within 15 business days.

New applicants for driver or vehicle services – including those applying for a REAL ID – will still be required to make an in-person DMV visit to ensure proper identity verification is conducted.

The kiosk technology was designed by Intellectual Technology Inc. (ITI), which was chosen as part of a competitive bid process. ITI operates self-service kiosks located in 17 states, including California, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, New Mexico, Nevada, North Carolina and West Virginia.

The kiosk program does not include any state funding or any additional costs to taxpayers. ITI will charge \$4.95 per transaction and a credit card processing fee if applicable.

Giannoulias Launches Distracted Driver Effort

Multifaceted Approach Aims to Combat Distracted Driving Among Teens

Kicking off national Teen Driver Safety Week, Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced his office is spearheading a multi-faceted campaign to raise awareness about the dangers of distracted driving.

The office's "One Road. One Focus" campaign – specifically geared toward educating teen drivers about the consequences of distracted driving – includes a new requirement for teens to watch a video that details the consequences of dangerous driving behaviors during their learner's permit phase before they receive their driver's license.

The office is also partnering with Illinois State Police (ISP) and Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) to identify areas prone to crashes and designate them as Distracted Driver Corridors throughout the state.

Launched by the National Highway Traffic Safety Authority (NHTSA), Teen Driver Safety Week reinforces young drivers' understanding of the impact of their behind-the-wheel decisions. According to NHTSA data, drivers 15-34 are most likely to be distracted at the time of fatal crashes.

"Decisions made behind the wheel impact all road users, whether that's other drivers, passengers, pedestrians, bicyclists or the families waiting at home for their loved one's safe arrival," Giannoulias said. "The mentality of valuing a text message over lives is completely unacceptable. We're committed to changing behaviors to make Illinois roads safer and to save lives."

Giannoulias is partnering with Brenda Protz, a Springfield woman who lost her 14-year-old daughter Jenna in a distracted driving incident that also took the lives of three others, including her daughter's best friend and her paternal grandparents. A young driver, charged with aggravated use of an electronic communications device and improper lane usage, crossed a median causing the crash.

"Distracted driving is a nationwide epidemic. My daughter Jenna and her friend Holly were only 14 when their lives ended," Protz said. "I have made it my mission to try and save the lives of others by spreading awareness about the different types of distracted driving and what those actions can do to a family."

The office is also working with stakeholders, including IDOT, ISP and road safety advocates like Chicago-based Bike Lane Uprising.

"Every year, ISP troopers issue thousands of citations and warnings for distracted driving. Despite this, our troopers still respond to hundreds of crashes, many the result of distracted driving," said ISP Director Brendan F. Kelly. "ISP will continue to work with Illinois Secretary of State Giannoulias and the campaign to combat distracted driving."

"Improving safety, eliminating crashes and saving lives requires a team effort," said Stephane B. Seck-Birhame, IDOT's bureau chief of Safety Programs and Engineering. "We know distracted driving is a problem across all age groups, but with teens in particular. We look forward to working with all stakeholders on potential solutions as we strive to drive down the number of fatalities on Illinois roads to zero, the only acceptable number."

"Vulnerable road users like bicyclists and pedestrians are being killed and injured at disproportionately high rates as a result of distracted driving, rising to the level of a public health crisis," said Christina Whitehouse, founder of Bike Lane Uprising. "We welcome the Illinois secretary of state's initiatives to address this issue and we urge other governmental agencies to explore additional opportunities to make our roadways safer."

Along with the video that teens will be required to view while in their learner's permit phase, other initiatives include:

- Partnering with IDOT and the Illinois General Assembly to declare new safety corridors in areas that have experienced a spike in crashes related to dangerous driving behaviors, including distracted driving. Signage in the corridors would alert drivers of the increased risk. Ohio introduced a similar measure, resulting in 30% fewer traffic crashes and 31% fewer injury crashes since the corridors were created in 2018.
- Collaborating with ISP to identify and coordinate Illinois Secretary of State Police patrols to enforce distracted driving laws in high-volume crash areas. The office will build on existing partnerships with law enforcement related to Scott's Law and DUI enforcement.
- Working with members of the General Assembly to create a grant program for law enforcement agencies to combat distracted driving and target initiatives geared toward their own community needs.
- Partnering with state's attorneys to boost the revocation of driving privileges of individuals who have caused great bodily harm while charges are processed.

Nearly 5,000 Entries Received in Flag Redesign Contest

Giannoulias Announces Flag Contest Next-Steps

Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced the Illinois Flag Commission received 4,844 entries during the six-week submission period that closed Oct. 18.

"I'm thrilled by the number of submissions the commission has received, as well as the excitement that this project has generated. I can't wait to see which designs the commission selects for public voting," Giannoulias said. "The contest has encouraged us all to reflect on what makes us proud to be Illinoisans, resulting in some great stories and unique designs reflecting what our state represents."

Now that the submission period is closed, the Illinois Flag Commission will meet before the end of the year to select the top 10 designs. Beginning in January, the public will have the opportunity to vote online for one of 10 new designs or one of the three former flag designs, including the current state flag, the 1918 Centennial Flag and the 1968 Sesquicentennial Flag.

After a public feedback period, the commission will report its findings to the Illinois General Assembly by April 1, 2025, whose members will vote on whether to adopt a new flag, return to a previous iteration of the flag or retain the current flag.

Senate Bill 1818, sponsored by state Sen. Doris Turner (48th District – Springfield) and state Rep. Kam Buckner (26th District – Chicago), was signed into law in 2023, creating the commission with the goals to gauge public sentiment on a new flag and to bolster civic pride. The Secretary of State's Office chairs the commission.

The commission will evaluate if a new state flag would better represent the state. The state flag has not had a major redesign since 1915.

Illinois Library Association Honors Giannoulias

Illinois Secretary of State and State Librarian Receives Award for Library Legislation that Protects the "Right-to-Read"

Illinois Secretary of State and State Librarian Alexi Giannoulias received the Illinois Library Association's (ILA) Robert R. McClarren Legislative Development Award at the association's 2024 awards program during its annual conference in Peoria following his administration's work to protect the "Right-to-Read."

"While I am absolutely honored to be the recipient of the Robert R. McClarren Award, this award is a reflection of the lifechanging work of our librarians and library community. Their dedication and devotion are reflections of true public service," said Giannoulias. "Here in Illinois, we protect the "Right-to-Read" and are grateful for the folks who make it possible."

"The Illinois Library Association's Public Policy Committee was honored to present this year's Robert R. McClarren Legislative Development Award to Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias," said Cynthia Robinson, executive director of ILA. "Secretary Giannoulias' dedication and impactful contributions to legislative development make him an outstanding recipient. The Illinois Library Association commends him for his commitment to the advancement of libraries and the broader community throughout the state of Illinois."

The Robert R. McClarren Award was established by the ILA in 1989 to honor an Illinois librarian, trustee, library or legislator who has contributed significantly to legislative development related to libraries in the state of Illinois.

Since taking office, Giannoulias' administration championed first-in-the-nation legislation designed to support public libraries by withholding state grants from libraries that remove books due to doctrinal or partisan disproval. Other states, such as Maryland and Minnesota, have since enacted similar legislation.

The office has also distributed more than \$104 million in grant funds to expand library services and collections, including grant funding to help eliminate the digital divide. The funding helps ensure geographic location and socioeconomic status are not barriers to accessing information.

Giannoulias' office is also pursuing legislation to provide libraries and librarians the same protections teachers and elected officials receive from threats and intimidation after at least 22 bomb threats were received by libraries throughout the state.

State Treasurer Frerichs, Illinois Department of Labor Team Up To Return Unpaid Wages and Penalties to Illinois Workers

Check I-CASH Site to See If You Have a Claim

Illinois workers can now search State Treasurer Michael Frerichs' I-CASH website (https://icash.illinoistreasurer.gov/) to see if unpaid wages and penalties pursued and collected by the Illinois Department of Labor are waiting for them to claim.

The addition of recovered wages to Treasurer Frerichs' missing money site is the result of a change in the law that state Sen. Robert Peters and state Rep. Marcus C. Evans Jr. shepherded through the General Assembly last year.

The Illinois Department of Labor (IDOL) investigates wage theft and recovers back wages when it finds that an employer has underpaid workers in violation of state law. Workers don't always know they have money coming their way however.

Wage theft investigations take time and sometimes a worker may move or change phone numbers by the time back wages have been collected, making them hard to locate. In other instances, IDOL may have conducted a worksite-wide audit and uncovered wage underpayments for workers who were not aware of the investigation at all.

The change in state law extended the time for wage recovery to three years to give the Illinois Department of Labor more time to search for and locate employees who are owed back wages. The law also ensured that after three years, IDOL can send unclaimed wages to Treasurer Frerichs' Unclaimed Property Trust Fund so that workers can still claim their money.

In recent months, the Illinois Department of Labor has started to send recovered unpaid wages to the State Treasurer's Office, which has added the names to the I-CASH site. So far, unpaid wages for 25 people have been added to the unclaimed property database. Workers can go to icash.illinoistreasurer.gov in the coming months to see if back wages are waiting for them to claim.

In addition, the change in state law sets aside some funding for the Illinois Department of Labor to support worker outreach and education regarding the recovery of unpaid wages.

"Hardworking people in Illinois deserve to be paid for their labor," Treasurer Frerichs said. "We are thankful to team up with the Illinois Department of Labor, Sen. Peters, and Rep. Evans on a common-sense solution."

"Ensuring workers are paid what they're owed is at the core of the Illinois Department of Labor's mission," said Illinois Department of Labor Director Jane Flanagan. "These updates to the law not only extend the timeframe during which the department can try to locate a worker who is owed unpaid wages, they also provide workers with a new tool to track down money that may be owed to them. We truly appreciate the partnership of the General Assembly and Treasurer Frerichs as we all strive to better serve Illinois workers."

Sen. Peters and Rep. Evans applauded the law's changes.

"Let's be clear: Wage theft is theft. It's in fact the leading form of theft," said Peters (D-Chicago). "People deserve as much time as possible to recover their unpaid wages."

"People who work and have wages unfairly withheld from them now have better recourse," said Evans (D-Chicago), the assistant House majority leader. "Working together to help people is what drives us in Springfield."

Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs Reminds 140,000 Residents Getting Missing Money to Cash the Check

\$13.2 Million Returned Through Enhanced Money Match

Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs is encouraging nearly 140,000 residents to cash the unclaimed property checks that may have arrived in the mail. The checks went out as part of the latest round of the Enhanced Money Match program, which allows the Treasurer's Office to automatically return missing money to people without the need to file a claim. The office leverages data the state already collects and crossmatches it with the state treasurer's unclaimed property database. Recently, the Treasurer's Office sent letters to unclaimed property owners that described the amount and source of the money.

"We put technology to work to return more money to people in our state. After all, the money belongs to them," Frerichs said. "But some people see the check in the mail and don't think it's real. Please don't forget to deposit or cash the check, or it ends up back with us as unclaimed property."

Since 2018, the Illinois Treasurer's Office has returned more than \$102 million to nearly 422,000 people through the Enhanced Money Match Program. The nearly 140,000 letters sent in this round makes it the largest Money Match ever performed in the nation.

State lawmakers approved legislation in recent years to allow the State Treasurer's Office to return even more money through the I-Cash Program. A law sponsored by state Sen. Sara Feigenholtz of Chicago and state Rep. Stephanie Kifowit of Oswego raised the limit on the amount that can be returned through Money Match from \$2,000 to \$5,000.

"It's a win-win when we can eliminate unnecessary steps and hurdles so that unclaimed property gets into the hands of its rightful owners as quickly as possible," Sen. Feigenholtz said.

"Many families are living paycheck to pay their bills," Rep. Kifowit said. "With the holidays quickly approaching, families receiving their money from I-Cash can make a difference, whether it is a fabulous meal, a special gift for their child or a little extra holiday cheer. It's the least we can do to help our Illinois' families."

Enhanced Money Match focuses on simple claims: Cash owed to a single person. Not included is cash owned by multiple parties, including a joint holding of a parent and minor child, as well as shares of stocks and bonds, escrow accounts and the contents of bank safe deposit boxes.

Enhanced Money Match is part of the office's Unclaimed Property Program, also known as I-CASH. It is one of the state's oldest consumer protection initiatives. In Illinois, the state treasurer is tasked with safeguarding unclaimed property, such as the contents of overlooked safe deposit boxes, unpaid life insurance benefits, forgotten bank accounts and unused rebate cards. Illinois holds more than \$5 billion in unclaimed property. More than \$2 billion has been returned since Frerichs took office, the most in state history. The state treasurer is legally required to return unclaimed property to its owners or heirs, no matter how long it takes.

The Mission to Return Purple Heart Medals to Their Rightful Owners

Illinois Treasurer Frerichs launched Operation Purple Heart in November 2021. He is seeking the public's help to return Purple Heart medals that have been especially difficult to return.

Each of the Purple Heart medals was inside a bank safe deposit box. Each bank determined the safe deposit box as abandoned because the owner(s) of the box had not touched it in several years. As a result, the contents of each safe deposit box were turned over to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office. Military medals are among the most difficult items to return because neither the Armed Forces nor the federal government maintain a comprehensive list of awardees.

Purple Hearts Awaiting Return to Their Proper Owners (As of Nov. 8, 2024)

- Robert Cawthon, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office Nov. 1, 1992, from 5/3rd Bank in Oak Park. There is conflicting information where Robert lived. Information suggests the awardee was in the infantry.
- Raymond Wilson, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office Nov. 13, 1995. Raymond lived in Chicago and banked with Chicago Community
 Bank, which subsequently was sold.
- Lawrence M. Burns, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office Nov. 5, 1997.
 Lawrence lived in Homewood and banked with Advanced Bank in Homewood.
 Information also suggests a financial relationship with Homewood Federal Savings and Loan. Today, there is information to suggest Mr. Burns chooses to live in a remote area in California.
- Linda K. Moore, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office Oct. 17, 2001. Linda lived in Peoria and banked with National City Bank in Peoria, which subsequently was sold. Information suggests a relationship with John L. Moore.
- Bernice Smith, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office Nov. 18, 2002. Bernice lived in Oak Park and banked with MB Financial Bank in Oak Park. The bank subsequently was sold.
- David Gorski, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office Oct. 30, 2003. David lived in Darien and banked with Hinsbrook Bank & Trust. Contents suggesting a relationship with WWII also were present, although it is difficult to determine if that is when the Purple Heart was earned.
- John Ustaszewski, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office in 2010. In addition to the Purple Heart, there also is a Bronze Star and a World War II campaign ribbon. John lived in Chicago and banked at TCF National Bank in Chicago.
- Michelle Steward or Patricia VanHasselaere, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office Oct. 31, 2018. It is believed they lived in Round Lake. A will for Patricia also was in the safe deposit box.
- Nancy Johnston, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office in 2021. There also was a Good Conduct Medal and an Air Force Medal. Nancy apparently lived in Frankfort and likely banked at Old Plank Trail Community Bank in Frankfort.
- James R. Bennett, submitted to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office in 2022. It was in a safe deposit box in the name of Ann Bennett who lived in Oak Lawn and banked with 5/3rd Bank. Also included in the safe deposit box are references to a Susan Bennett.

The names above are the names associated with the bank safe deposit box and might not be the name of the Purple Heart awardee.

Clearing the Way: Forest Preserves Prepares for Winter Weather

The Forest Preserves may never know how much snow will cover its 70,000 acres on any given winter day, but our crews are always ready with nearly 60 snowplows and salt trucks. When winter weather arrives, the Preserves open as quickly as possible to be safe for all visitors – and for the environment, too.

Three brining trucks from the Landscape Maintenance Division hit the road before the first flake hits the ground at priority locations among the 251 parking lots across the Preserves, facilities such as nature centers, campgrounds, pavilions, off-leash dog areas, sledding hills, visitor centers, the volunteer resource center, police stations and maintenance yards.

Brining before the snow arrives is part of the Forest Preserves' aim to limit the amount of salt put down on parking lots. Excess salt can get into waterways and the soil that supports native plants. By diluting with water, brine makes it easier for plows to get down to the pavement surface and remove all snow and ice, allowing salt to be used conservatively in the middle of lots and entrances so that cars entering and exiting will spread it around.

Six Flu Myths Debunked by a Walgreens Pharmacist

Is it Too Late to Get Caccinated? No Way, and Walgreens Pharmacy Manager Kaliope Tsirogiannis Explains What's Fact and Fiction About All Things Flu, Vaccines and Testing

Feverish foreheads, contagious coughs and unstoppable sniffles confirm sick season is in full swing. As the holidays approach and many spend more time indoors with loved ones, the risk of contracting common respiratory illnesses like flu, COVID-19, pneumonia and RSV will rise.

But germs aren't the only things spreading this winter; many vaccine-related myths and misinformation are also circulating and posing a risk to the health and safety of communities.

Pharmacy manager Kaliope Tsirogiannis, who has worked at Walgreens for 24 years, breaks down common flu myths that you might hear this season.

Myth #1: I'm healthy, so I don't need to get vaccinated.

FALSE. Vaccines are a safe and dependable way to help build immunity even in healthy individuals. They are the best way to protect against respiratory illnesses and reduce the severity of symptoms if you do get sick.

"A lot of people really think this myth is true and ask about it," Tsirogiannis says. "And although a flu shot might not always prevent you from getting the flu, it may prevent you from being hospitalized because of the flu."

This time of year can be busy, but it's critical that everyone takes the time to get their annual flu shot, updated COVID-19 vaccine and other CDC-recommended immunizations, like RSV and pneumonia (pneumococcal). Getting vaccinated also reduces the chances that you'll spread respiratory illnesses to people who are at higher risk of developing severe complications.

Myth #2: Getting the flu shot can give you the flu.

FALSE. Injectable flu vaccines are not infectious because they're made with inactive flu strains, Tsirogiannis says.

"When I hear this one, I just explain to patients that it's not going to cause the flu," she says. "Worst case symptoms after a flu shot are going to be a low-grade fever and some redness or soreness at the injection site."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), symptoms of the flu include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, headaches, body aches and fatigue.

Myth #3: It's too late to get vaccinated.

FALSE. If you haven't gotten the flu, COVID-19 or RSV vaccine, it's not too late.

"At the end of the day, it's better to get vaccinated than not be vaccinated at all," Tsirogiannis says.

However, you should get your recommended vaccines as soon as possible, especially before you travel or gather this holiday season to allow for time for immunity to fully develop and increase your protection.

Walgreens makes it simple to get all the recommended vaccines you need in one visit. Myth #4: I won't be able to afford my vaccinations.

FALSE. The flu shot and other recommended vaccines are covered by most insurance plans and for those who are uninsured, Walgreens offers 200,000 flu shot vouchers annually to provide free flu immunizations for medically underserved populations that need them most. Vouchers are available in-store and at clinics operated by Walgreens off-site, while supplies last.

"Just talk to your local pharmacist about the vouchers and they'll explain it you," Tsirogiannis says.

The voucher program is part of a broader effort by Walgreens to help ensure underserved and at-risk communities stay safe from respiratory illnesses while improving awareness, access and equity to vaccines.

Myth #5: Pregnant women shouldn't get a flu shot.

FALSE. They should. Pregnant women – along with young children and seniors – are at a higher risk for complications if they contract the flu. "Getting vaccinated while pregnant can also help protect a baby from flu, especially since they are too young to get vaccinated for the first few months of life," Tsirogiannis says.

Are there any group of patients who shouldn't get a flu shot? According to the CDC, there are only a few groups who shouldn't, including children younger than 6 months; people with life-threatening allergies to any ingredient in a flu vaccine (other than egg proteins) like gelatin, antibiotics or other ingredients; and people who have had a severe allergic reaction to a flu shot in the past.

Allergic to eggs? Flu vaccines are safe to administer to people with egg allergy of any severity.

Myth #6: I have mild symptoms, so I don't need to get tested for flu or COVID-19.

Flu and COVID-19 have similar symptoms to the common cold or other respiratory illnesses. Individuals who are experiencing a runny or stuffy nose, cough or other respiratory symptoms should consider getting tested.


"Especially with the holidays coming up, you should get tested not just for yourself, but to protect your loved ones around you," Tsirogiannis says. "You don't want to pass the flu or COVID-19 on to someone who is immunocompromised."

Recognizing that the cost of new EVs is still a main barrier to EV adoption, the ComEd Pre-Owned Electric Fleet Vehicle Rebate will help more commercial customers – including businesses of all sizes and public sector customers – qualify for pre-owned electric fleet vehicle purchase rebates ranging from \$5,000-\$180,000 depending on the vehicle class they are purchasing and on whether the customer is located in or primarily serves a low-income or equity-investment eligible community (EIEC).

Customers interested in utilizing the fleet EV rebate program must complete a rebate application within 90 days of vehicle delivery. Through the program, pre-owned vehicles qualify for the same amounts of funding as new EVs. ComEd customers can submit rebate applications at ComEd.com/clean.

"Programs, such as the newly expanded Comed pre-owned vehicle rebates, will be instrumental in expanding access to electric vehicles across the state," said Megha Lakhchaura, EV officer for the state of Illinois. "Pre-owned EVs can be a key entry point for business and public entities to adopt electric vehicles and further benefit from fuel savings. Illinois Energy Companies and BBB Remind Customers of Increase in Scams During the Holiday Season

On Utility Scam Awareness Day (Nov. 20), ComEd, Nicor Gas, Peoples Gas and North Shore Gas Provided Tips to Identify Scams Used to Steal Money and Personal Information From Families and Businesses

With the holiday season upon us, northern Illinois energy companies are joining the Better Business Bureau (BBB) of Chicago and Northern Illinois to warn customers to be on heightened alert for attempted scams, which tend to increase during this time of year.

During national Utility Scam Awareness Day, ComEd, Nicor Gas, Peoples Gas and North Shore Gas reminded families and businesses to stay vigilant to imposters who will show up at homes and businesses, then threaten to turn off utility service if payment is not immediately made.

"Scammers use the holiday season to increase their attempts to separate businesses and consumers from their money and personal information, like Social Security or bank account numbers," added Steve J. Bernas, president and CEO of the Better Business Bureau. "Scammers know that we're busier this time of year, distracted with plans and paying less attention to our spending and bill-paying habits. They use urgency and demands to pay now or lose power, which is something ComEd or other utilities would never do."

Scammers are getting creative and expanding their schemes in the digital space. Traditionally, they use technology to call using a number that looks like the name and number of a legitimate business. More recently, imposters are sending QR codes and instructing recipients to make payments at retail stores like Walmart and Walgreens. Others are demanding payment through mobile banking apps.

"ComEd is committed, especially during the holidays, to helping customers identify potential schemes so they don't unwittingly send their money and personal information to imposters," said Melissa Washington, senior vice president of Customer Operations and Strategic Initiatives at ComEd. "When it comes to mobile banking apps, the scammer will claim not to have received a payment to get the victim to transfer money two or three times, allowing imposters to scam victims out of thousands of dollars with a single encounter."

"Scammers are also using new technology more and more, but the way to keep yourself safe remains tried and true," said Bill Mastoris, interim president – Peoples Gas and North Shore Gas. "If what the person is saying doesn't feel right or if you're being pressured in any way, end the conversation, hang up the phone or close the door. If you have any further concern, contact your utility using the phone number or website address on your utility bill."

Recently, private companies or individuals unaffiliated with energy companies are posing as bill-management companies and offer to manage customer bills on their behalf. These fraudulent companies place the utility account in their name and collect the customer's payment, but do not forward it to the utility.

"We hold ourselves accountable to customers first and foremost and will never use aggressive or intimidating tactics to pressure customers into making a payment toward their natural gas bill," said Pat Whiteside, senior vice president of Operations at Nicor Gas. "The personal safety and financial security of our employees and customers are of utmost importance."

Tips to Help Identify Scam Attempts

Illinois energy companies remind customers that they will never call or visit a home or business to:

- Pressure you into making an immediate payment using aggressive or threatening tactics.
- Threaten to disconnect service if payment is not made within a short timeframe.
- · Ask for direct payment with a prepaid cash card like Green Dot or a third-party payment app like Zelle, Cash App, QuickPay and Venmo.
- Ask for personal information, such as Social Security number or driver's license number, or banking information is needed for a refund.

If a utility field representative visits your home or business, they will wear logoed uniforms and provide identification. If contacted by phone, verify the legitimacy of the call by requesting the caller confirm information only you would know, such as date, amount or method of last payment.

If ever in doubt about the validity of the person calling or at your door, hang up or shut the door and call the energy company using a phone number from a trusted source like your latest bill or the company website or mobile app.

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
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
